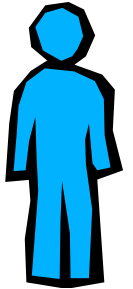


Drug 'mule'

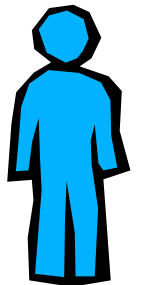
He has just set alight about \$1m worth of finest Trinidadian marijuana crop. "Yes, it feels a little strange but at least this way the drug dealers won't get the money." The officer and his team spend much of their week on missions like this.

"Coca is a means of survival for us, because the soil is very tired, very eroded. Coca leaves are the only option we have for earning a living to feed our families."

"I would wake up feeling sick and spend the day stealing and begging for money to support my habit."

I'd help sell about £10 000 worth of drugs per week, of which me and my mate got a 10% cut - so between us we got roughly £500 each. When I got more customers I earned around £1 000 a day. I soon got hooked on heroin and my life went even more downhill.

"Drugs come in mostly by container on ships, usually on the largest trade routes, and through the main docks such as Felixstowe, Liverpool and Southampton. They also come in cargo via airports and passengers and their luggage. As well as stopping the drugs at sea and airports, we tackle the problem near the source as much as possible. We have overseas officers in Columbia and Peru for instance."
